

# Rainbows ramble past Lobos, 41-31

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — On a day when he couldn't find his mouthpiece, Walter Briggs may have helped the 32 career The Rainbows record up San Francisco State's first win in 11 years — an average of 6.6 yards per play — a starting quarterback. Briggs, who was recruited from his hometown of Honolulu, gave his first collegiate start for losing his mouthpiece in pre-game drills, made good on his second chance yesterday. He played for two touchdowns and ran for another score as the Rainbows defeated New Mexico, 41-31.

Briggs, who had arthroscopic surgery on his knee last month and re-

But even the UH defense, with Ali Noga getting his first quarterback sack in 14 quarters, had its moments. Noga

had four tackles for losses, and nose guard Dana Director had two sacks. Together, they helped the UH defense keep the Lobos from turning three turnovers into points, and held New Mexico to 130 yards in the second half.

"If we played in the second half as well as we did in the first, there is no way we could have won," said Rick Sherman, the UH defensive coordinator. "I guess this is what you call winning."

Said UH head coach Bob Wagner: "I wasn't pretty and wasn't crisp, but it was a win. A win is a win in a win."

It is that and much more for the Rainbows (3-1), who won on the road for the first time since the middle of last season at Utah, four games ago. It was only their second victory in their last seven games on the Mainland.

Never mind that it came against weak New Mexico (0-5), a team with its hand never far from a self-destruct button.

It was a big win coming as it did in a Western Athletic Conference game. See Rainbows, Page C-5

# Leonard has Giants humming, baby, 4-2

SAN FRANCISCO — A mid-game conversation with his son reminded Jeffrey Leonard to have fun. And that's exactly what he did.

Leonard set one home-run record and tied another last night, helping the San Francisco Giants even the National League championship playoffs with a 4-2 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Leonard, who has angered the Cardinals with his slow home-run trot, connected for the fourth consecutive game, setting a playoff mark. His four total home runs tied the record for a championship series.

"My real motivation tonight was, between innings, I went upstairs to talk to my son," Leonard said. "It relaxed me and, told me you could have fun."

Leonard didn't have much fun the previous night, when his team squandered a four-run lead and he was hit in the shoulder by a pitch. He rebounded quickly to set a record.

"I'm not thinking about re-

corda," Leonard said. "I do have fun."

Rob Thompson and Bob Hersh added homers to give the Giants eight for the series.

"The three home runs did us in," St. Louis manager Whitey Herzog said. "It's a 2-2 game. We're in a best-of-three series."

Leonard followed Kevin Mitchell's two-out double with a drive over the left-field fence in the fifth inning, overbuilding a sturdy effort by Giants starter Mike Krukow. The game attracted a Candelstick Park-record crowd of 37,677, topping the mark set the previous night, October 9, when the home did not match his first three for dis-

# No progress seen in NFL talks

WASHINGTON — An National Football League teams prepared for a second week of talks today and tomorrow night, little progress was reported from yesterday's round of meetings between players union chief Gene Upshaw and the owners' negotiator, Jack Donaghy.

The NFL Management Council, which bargains for the league's 28 owners, claimed the union's proposal on unrestricted free agency is unchanged and still the No. 1 obstacle to reaching an agreement.

But the NFL Players Association says that it "categorically insists" and that the owners' demand for a six-year contract and changes in the 20-year-old pension system are the two major roadblocks.

Jack Allen, assistant executive director of the NFLPA, outlined a free agency proposal currently on the table that the union feels would blow player
